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2.4. The minutes of the meeting, with revisions as discussed, was approved by the body.

3. Matters Arising from previous MSG Meetings

5 3.1. The Secretariat presented the matters arising from the 1st to 5th regular MSG meetings.

3.2. On the election of co-chairs of the MSG, body agreed to calendar its discussion during the next MSG meeting in Davao.

3.3. On companies providing information for EITI, the body agreed that there was no need for the Department of Energy (DOE) and the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) to issue new regulations since both departments were signatories to the statement of commitment signed during the National EITI Conference in January. This should suffice as basis for writing companies they regulate to submit all the data required for the EITI implementation.

On the other hand, it was also noted that the training on the development of the reporting template will give the MSG a clearer idea on whether there was still a need for DOE and DENR to write the said letter. The body agreed that the letter to be written to the companies by the DENR and DOE will be based on the training results.

3.4. Representatives from the Chamber of Mines of the Philippines (COMP) shared that from 2005 to 2006, COMP undertook a project funded by AUSAID where the taxes paid by two mining companies were reconciled with the taxes received by their respective local government units. COMP added that the reconciliation process showed that local government units did not receive their share of excise tax on time. With this, one of the outputs of the project is a joint memorandum of agreement between various agencies and that is why Philippine Poverty and Environment Initiative (PPEI) now is doing the reconciliation of these information

3.5. The Secretariat shared that government data to be included in the EITI report should be audited. However, it was recalled that during the 1st MSG meeting, the issue was raised whether a separate entity other than Commission on Audit (COA) can audit financial reports from government agencies.

The body agreed to ask the EITI consultants to first clarify what kind of government report needs to be audited before coordinating with COA.

36 3.6. The Secretariat shared that there is an offer from Timor Leste to conduct a training on their Petroleum
 Fund process for the PH-EITI MSG. The body agreed to include this item in the agenda for the October
 meeting.

40 3.7. The Secretariat informed the body that the industry already submitted the list of payments made to the national and local governments. While on the part of the government, the Secretariat is still waiting for the list of payments collected by the DOE and the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP).

3.8. The comments on the internal rules were already incorporated and the revised Internal Rules (IR) was already circulated through the e-group. The Secretariat mentioned that they had not received any comments from the MSG members thus, the proposed IR of the PH-EITI was deemed approved. The Secretariat informed the body that the signing of the IR will be done at the end of the meeting.

3.9. The Secretariat explained that the MOU and the Terms of Reference (TOR) of the MSG members were updated to incorporate revisions on the provisions for the requirement for quorum and the selection of MSG representatives to ensure continuity. The provisions in the MOU and TOR were made consistent with the provisions of the Executive Order (EO) creating the PH-EITI.

3.10. The Secretariat added that the composition of the MSG stated in the MOU and TOR was revised to include the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG). The recommendation was made by the Mining Industry Coordinating Council (MICC) in view of the resignation of Secretary Elisea G. Gozun.

The Secretariat informed the body that the amended MOU will also be signed at the end of the meeting.

3.11. The Chair, likewise, acknowledged the presence of Ms. Castro and Ms. Cruz, both representatives from the DILG.

- 3.12. The MSG agreed to move the discussion on the following items to the main business of the meeting:
- Freedom of Information Bill
 - List of accredited reconcilers
 - BIR waiver
 - Training on new EITI rules

- 3.13. Other pending matters that the Secretariat mentioned were the following:
 - Establishment and management of a revenue-linked database which may be done after the MDTF is released to the DOF.
 - For the DOE to check the legality of including the service contracts in the waiver that the companies will execute. The body agreed that this query will be included in the letter to be sent by PH-EITI inquiring from the DOE regarding their official policy on disclosure of information.
 - It was also mentioned that a similar letter was sent to DENR-MGB. MGB mentioned that they already have a sample administrative order on their policy on disclosure of information.

4. Updates from MICC

4.1. The Chair informed the body that there were two significant matters relating to EITI that were discussed during the last MICC meeting, one is the EO and the other is the draft Mining Bill.

 4.2. It was mentioned that the EO was already circulated to the members of the MICC for comments and that the Secretariat already received comments from the Department of Transportation and Communications (DOTC) and the Office of the Presidential Adviser for Environmental Protection (OPAEP). The comments will be part of the agenda for the next MICC meeting.

4.3. As for the draft Mining Bill, it was shared to the body that the proposal was provisionally approved by the MICC and that the bill will be submitted to Congress by September 2013.

5. Comments on BIR Waiver

5.1. Representatives of COMP stated that their legal committee has already approved a draft waiver. It was also mentioned that the said draft was sent to the representatives of both non-COMP members and the oil and gas sector for them to inform their members and get approval for the draft waiver. Once an approved draft has been provided by the other industry sectors, the COMP will furnish the Secretariat with the approved draft of the waiver. The Secretariat will then submit the draft waiver to the Bureau of Internal Revenue (BIR) for review.

6. MSG's resolution supporting the Freedom of Information Bill

6.1. It was suggested that the MSG review the draft resolution and rephrase it such that it will not mention any bill in particular and will only state the objective of transparency and the need for disclosure of information. The members of the MSG were asked to propose wordings for the resolution and submit it to the Secretariat. The body likewise agreed that the revised resolution will be discussed in the next MSG meeting.

The body agreed.

7. Trainings to be conducted by EITI International

7.1. The Secretariat shared that Mr. Wouter Biesterbos of the EITI International Secretariat and Mr. Philip Chan of World Bank are planning to conduct a joint mission to the Philippines on September 26 and 27, 2013. The Secretariat explained that in the joint mission, Mr. Biesterbos and Mr. Chan will give the following trainings:

- Trainings on new EITI rules
- Trainings on how to develop the communications plan for Philippine EITI
- Guidelines on how to choose the reconciler
- Financial tracking and revenue management

It was further discussed that the possible outcome of the joint mission is that there might be certain revisions in the previously approved work plan of PH-EITI. Since the work plan was designed based on the

old EITI standards, certain additional information have to be included in the EITI report in view of the new standards which were adopted in May.

7.2. The MSG and Technical Working Group (TWG) of PH-EITI were encouraged to attend the joint mission and to calendar this activity as scheduled on September 26-27, 2013

8. Short List of Possible Reconcilers

8.1. The Secretariat presented the list of auditing firms that was already narrowed down from 373 to 22 auditing firms. It was explained to the body that the basis for shortlisting is the fact that international auditing standards must be followed, and therefore, the practice in different countries is that the reconciler must be affiliated with an international auditing firm.

8.2. The Secretariat added that the names of the 22 auditing firms on the short list were based on the official list from the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC). The said list indicates the foreign auditing firms that were in partnership with a local auditing firms and the country where these foreign auditing firms were based.

8.3. Mr. Wouter Biesterbos of the EITI Secretariat also mentioned that they were in the process of coming up with the standard TOR for the reconciler, which the MSG can use as a guide in further trimming down the shortlist of reconcilers.

8.4. It was cited that the budget for the reconciler will not be available until 2014 since the funds will come from DBM. However, the new EITI rules required that the reconciler be involved from the start during the development of the reporting template. It was also shared that in other countries the reconciler conducted the scoping study which will be the basis of the template. Thus, there was a suggestion that the Secretariat be mandated to raise funds in order to contract the reconciler for the period beginning August to December 2013. The reconciler will start working on the scoping study and the development of the reporting template.

- 8.5. The Secretariat raised a concern on the bidding process mandated by law if the reconciler will be contracted using funds from development partners. It was suggested that the Secretariat first look on how the MSG can proceed given this concern.
- 32 8.6. It was also suggested that MSG start surveying the cost of implementing the EITI since the P3 million 33 budget might not be enough to cover the cost of auditing the 38 mining companies covered in the first EITI 34 report.

9. TOR with PPEI

9.1. The Secretariat recalled that it was suggested in the last MSG meeting that the there was a need to further define the participation of the MSG in subnational implementation and in other components of the PPEI work plan which were similar to the components of the EITI work plan. Thus, the Secretariat drafted the terms of reference between PPEI, EITI and Bantay Kita.

 9.2. It was elaborated that in the draft TOR, the Secretariat already identified the scope of collaboration between the parties. It was explained that Bantay Kita was included since it was already in the process of conducting the subnational implementation, hence, the need to define clearly in the TOR the extent of the participation of all the members.

- 9.3. Under the scope of collaboration the Secretariat identified the following joint undertakings between the parties:
 - Establishment of a management information system for the mining sector in coordination with DENR-MGB which is included in the workplan of both PH-EITI and PPEI
 - Study on the policy and legal framework for EITI implementation in the Philippines, including administrative and legal barriers as well as recommendations to address the same
 - Development of a module for subnational implementation of EITI

9.4. It was likewise noted that the PPEI and Bantay Kita shall collaborate on matters pertaining to EITI subnational implementation as both parties deemed feasible.

9.5. The Secretariat also pointed out that the PH-EITI's involvement in subnational implementation as stipulated in the PH-EITI work plan, shall be to provide technical assistance to pilot sites.. Technical assistance shall mean the conduct of briefings at the local level and giving inputs and advice regarding EITI implementation.

9.6. The Secretariat shared that they circulated the draft TOR through the e-group one week before the meeting and no comments were received by the Secretariat.

9.7. Members of the MSG asked for another week for them to review the draft TOR.

10. Other Matters

10.1. The Secretariat shared that at present, they were not yet handling funds since the budget for the EITI was just recently transferred to the DOF. Thus, they have no financial report to present.

32 10.2. The Secretariat, however, acknowledged that they have been receiving support from the British 33 Embassy for expenses in the conduct of the MSG meetings.

35 10.3. It was also shared that the grant from AUSAID is still being processed.

10.4. As for the Multi-Donor Trust Fund (MDTF), the Secretariat informed the body that the documents for the MDTF application were already sent to Mr. Philip Chan of World Bank for review. The Secretariat also gave the following updates:

• Procurement plan has been cleared by World Bank Manila through their Lead Procurement Specialist. The Secretariat sent it to Mr. Chan for his final approval and issuance of a statement of no objection.

• Mr. Chan suggested that the MSG wait for the joint mission to be conducted in September so that any further revisions to the PH-EITI work plan can already be incorporated in the final procurement plan. However, this would mean that the MSG has to move the timetable for the implementation of activities under the MDTF.

• The World Bank will conduct a procurement capacity assessment on the DOF as part of their requirement for the approval of the MDTF.

10.5. The Secretariat mentioned that the Cabinet Cluster on Good Governance and Anti-Corruption (GGAC) is conducting an on-going monitoring of all government projects. The EITI, being under the GGAC, is one of the projects being monitored.

10.6. The Secretariat reported that the GGAC asked for a copy of the PH-EITI work plan and they will be monitoring the progress of EITI implementation to see if the PH-EITI MSG is on schedule.

20 10.7. The Secretariat also informed the body that GGAC is asking the PH-EITI to submit a monthly project status report.

10.8. It was also noted that GGAC expressed their willingness to extend their assistance if ever there will be interventions needed to expedite the implementation of the work plan.

10.9. The MSG members signed the amended MOU and the approved Internal Rules of PH-EITI before the meeting was adjourned.

10.10. It was suggested that the draft EO which was submitted to the MICC be revised further to state that the President shall be given the power to designate the government agencies that will be represented in the MSG. Hence, the provision enumerating the agencies that will be part of the MSG should be amended to give more leeway in the selection of government representatives to the MSG. The Secretariat was tasked to submit the additional proposed revisions to the MICC secretariat so that it may be reviewed by the MICC members in time for the next MICC meeting.

ADJOURNMENT

There being no other matters to discuss, the meeting was adjourned at 10:45 AM.
