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I. GENERAL ASSESSMENT OF YEAR'S PERFORMANCE

SUMMARY OF ACTIVITIES

On its first year of implementation, Philippine EITI's activities focused primarily on the institutionalization of EITI in the country and stakeholder engagement. on These entailed numerous consultations and outreach activities to explain what EITI is to key officials in the government, national government agencies, local government units, the oil, gas, mining and coal sectors, and civil society organizations including indigenous peoples and the academe. Following these consultations and outreach activities, an interim multi-



stakeholder group was formed to work on defining the roles of the MSG through the execution of a Terms of Reference and Memorandum of Understanding. Subsequently, the permanent multi stakeholder group was formally constituted through a selection process undertaken by each sector pursuant to their own rules. Monthly MSG meetings were thereafter conducted where the MSG discussed the direction and scope of the EITI process in the Philippines. The PH-EITI Secretariat was likewise formed and lodged under the Department of Finance.

Once formally created, the MSG drafted a work plan which was further revised to conform to the new EITI standard. In line with this, the MSG formulated the following objectives for EITI implementation in the Philippines:



1. Show direct and indirect contribution of extractives to the economy

2. Improve public understanding of the management of natural resources and availability of data

3. Strengthen national resource management / strengthen government systems

4. Create opportunities for dialogue and constructive engagement in natural resource management in order to build trust and reduce conflict among stakeholders

5. Strengthen business environment and increase investments

To provide legal basis for EITI's creation, Executive Order No. 147 was issued by President Benigno Aquino III.

When the objectives were formulated and the work plan was finalized, the MSG conducted a series of forums/workshops with key stakeholders including legislators, local government officials, and national government agencies. Simultaneously, the civil society and the business sector conducted parallel outreach activities with their constituents.

The MSG also determined the scope of the first report, and in the process commissioned a scoping study and conducted learning sessions with resource speakers from government agencies and state-owned enterprises. In the process, it was able to identify barriers to EITI implementation such as the existence of a confidentiality clause in the Tax Code and in the Omnibus Investments Code. The MSG addressed this by requiring companies to execute a waiver allowing the BIR to disclose their tax information.

On May 15-16, 2014, PH-EITI conducted its second National Conference where an annual report of its activities was presented to all stakeholders. In the same conference, the MSG members conducted a sectoral assessment of their participation in the EITI process on its first year of implementation. The strengths and weaknesses identified in common by the MSG members in the said assessment are reflected in this report.

HOW THE ACTIVITIES SUPPORT THE OBJECTIVES OF PH-EITI IMPLEMENTATION

First Objective: Show direct and indirect contribution of extractives to the economy

The methodical manner through which EITI was established and institutionalized in the country contributes to the first objective of showing the direct and indirect contribution of the extractives to the economy through the EITI process. The careful selection of representatives in the MSG was crucial in making sure that all relevant stakeholders will participate in the report to ensure its comprehensiveness. In addition, the MSG's directive for companies to execute a waiver to allow the disclosure of their tax information aims to ensure that all material companies are covered in the report so that the industry's real contribution to the economy is shown. Likewise, the MSG agreed to extend the scope of disclosures in its first EITI report to include information that will show the indirect benefits generated by each company to local communities in the form of voluntary social expenditures or programs.

Second Objective: Improve public understanding of the management of natural resources and availability of data

Forums and learning sessions conducted by the MSG contributed to this second objective. While it cannot be said yet at this point that significant gains have been achieved by the EITI process in improving the public's understanding of the management of natural resources, these forums have at least provided a platform for stakeholders to discuss relevant issues on natural resource manage-

Examples that may be cited are the local government forums and the recent national conference which provided the stakeholders opportunities to discuss issues relating to natural resource management.

As for the objective of improving the availability of data, EITI implementation is being used as a tool to evaluate the current state of our data as well as the data generation processes of government agencies. Stakeholders now appreciate the fact that responsible mining companies are willing to open their books to show the taxes they are paying the government, both national and local through a waiver for the BIR. Taking the stakeholders to the mine sites also broadened the stakeholder's understanding of what mining companies do with respect to their operations, environmental protection measures and social development programs.

Third Objective: Strengthen national resource management / strengthen government systems

Considering that PH-EITI is still at the early stages of implementation, it is yet to be seen how EITI can contribute to achieving the third objective. Suffice it to state, however, that the process of producing our first report has provided an opportunity for the MSG to examine government systems specifically the collection processes of certain agencies, the regulations and practices with regard to allocation of resources at the local level, the way records are being kept, and gaps in data generation. The need to know how the revenues from extractive industries are being utilized is an important consideration for the MSG, which is why forums with local government units and a learning session with the Department of Budget and Management were conducted.

Fourth Objective: Create opportunities for dialogue and constructive engagement in natural resource management in order to build trust and reduce conflict among stakeholders

EITI implementation in the Philippines has allowed the different sectors to regularly meet and discuss the direction that the country should take in promoting transparency in the extractive sector through the EITI process. While it is difficult at this point to measure the extent to which EITI has reduced conflict among stakeholders, it is recognized by all sectors that the production of the first EITI report is a priority, and this common goal creates an opportunity for the sectors to engage in a constructive and sustained dialogue, revenues being a public issue and of an important concern for all stakeholders.

Fifth Objective: Strengthen business environment and increase investments

Considering that PH-EITI is still at the early stages of implementation, there is no way yet for the country to measure how the EITI process has contributed to this objective. Nevertheless, all sectors are in agreement that the country's commitment to implement the EITI sends a strong message to the international community and the business sector that the Philippines is determined to promote good governance in the industry and envisions the process as a measure to strengthen business environment.

Aside from MSG members, stakeholders such as local government officials, national agencies, mining, oil and gas companies, as well as civil society organiza- tions participated in such forums. It should be noted, however, that such information should still be presented to the broader public. government systems	The forum conducted with national agencies and with the local government drifts brought to light the current state of data generation by government offices. Subse- quent consultation meetings with these government offices reveal the gaps in exist- ing systems that may be addressed and strengthened through the EITI process. For example, the lack of a single source of data in offices makes it difficult to gather information even within a single agency. In certain instances, like in local govern- ment payments, data should be further disaggregated to evaluate the real contribu- tion of the extractive sector. Through coordination with relevant agencies, the EITI process provides a feedback mechanism where such concerns are elevated to the proper authority. In addition, the EITI process has also facilitated an easier coordi- nation among agencies. However, it must be noted that considering that PH-EITI is still in the process of preparing its first report, discussions have focused not so much on national resource management but primarily on the preparation of the re- port itself. Nevertheless, forums with local government units and even in Congress inevitably surfaced the various issues surrounding the industry, and the MSG ex- pects such discussions to be more pronounced once the report is produced.

V. SPECIFIC STRENGTHS AND WEAKNESSES IDENTIFIED IN THE EITI PROCESS

EFFORTS TO STRENGTHEN EITI IMPLEMENTATION

The following measures were implemented to strengthen EITI implementation:

- Creation of working committees to focus on specific areas of concern--- Ad-hoc committees were created by the MSG to ensure a more detailed and thorough discussion of specific concerns. This was done in the formulation of the work plan, in finalizing the terms of reference of the Independent Administrator, in evaluating the scoping study, and in the discussions of subnational implementation. A technical working group also serves as an advisory body to the MSG.
- 2. The MSG agreed to extend the scope of the EITI report to include non-mandatory disclosures such as revenue management, voluntary social expenditures and contractual stipulations. In addition, the MSG extended the scope of disclosures for the following contextual information that will be reported on a per company basis: a. labor and employment which will reflect data on gender, nationalities of employees, nature of employment, and employment of indigenous peoples; b. reconciliation of export data including value and volume of exports per mineral, country of destination, companies to whom exports were made, and pricing; c. incentives regime and list of incentives availed of by each company; d. special funds including a description of how they are managed and spent. Company profiles, disaggregated costs for social expenditures, and list of suppliers and contractors of extractive companies are also included.
- 3. In support of the second objective of improving public understanding of the management of natural resources, the PH-EITI work plan provides for numerous outreach activities to increase public

awareness not only on the EITI process but also on issues surrounding the industry. Once the report is published, the succeeding activities in the work plan will focus on actively discussing the report with key stakeholders by conducting regional/local conferences all over the country.

 The MSG will continue to engage legislators in the process with the objective of institutionalizing Philippine EITI through legislation.



- 5. The execution of the BIR waiver was adopted by the MSG as a measure to address the legal impediment in the Philippine tax code prohibiting the disclosure of tax information. Interventions are currently being made at the top level to make sure that all material companies execute the waiver.
- 6. The viability of subnational implementation has been discussed by a working group within the MSG. A study has been commissioned for this purpose.
- 7. Aside from capacitating the MSG members and those who are directly involved in the reporting process, capacity building activities for the media, lawyers, accountants and technical staff in government are included in the work plan.
- 8. Capacity building activities for the secretariat to equip the staff and educate them on the technical aspect of EITI implementation are included in the work plan.
- 9. The MSG continues to engage development partners in the process. Currently, the British, Australian and Canadian embassies are supporting PH-EITI.
- 10. Learning sessions were conducted with government agencies to inform the MSG on the fiscal regime and flows of payments.
- 11. The different sectors separately conducted parallel activities to educate their members and engage them in the EITI process.

WEAKNESSES

- The absence of an enabling law to compel all companies to participate in the process is one major challenge. This has been evident in the refusal of some companies to execute the BIR waiver and of the difficulty in getting the Board of Investments to disclose incentives. Nevertheless, even without an enabling law, the government is in a position to encourage the companies' participation in the EITI.
- 2. The different methods of data generation and record keeping employed by agencies pose a problem in data collection.
- 3. More efforts should be done to link EITI with other related initiatives.
- 4. More technical assistance should be given to the reporting entities especially at the local level.
- 5. The pool of experts in extractive industries should be broadened.
- 6. Uncertainty of funding poses problems in the continuous implementation of activities.

VI. TOTAL COSTS OF IMPLEMENTATION

The following costs were incurred in implementing EITI. As indicated below, activities were funded by the Philippine government, the British Embassy (through a grant given to Bantay Kita), the Embassy of Canada - DFATD, Australian Government - DFAT, other Bantay Kita Donors, the Chamber of Mines of the Philippines, and the World Bank.
